Companies use codified (patents) and non-codified (know-how) intellectual capital to drive commercial growth



Intellectual capital has traditionally been
“Closed”, restricting rights to drive value



Tradition is occasionally challenged, and
methods of doing business evolve



Free Software focuses on collaborative innovation between many stakeholders, creating an “Open” way of doing business



Today we see a global market that is Open
and Closed, not Open or Closed



We need to address this reality



Free Software is the most important
approach to innovation of the post-industrial
era



According to IDC, the Linux eco-system will drive a 49 billion USD economy by 2011

(35.7% yearly growth rate since 2006)



According to UNU Merit, Free Software-related services in the EU may equal 32% of the IT market and 4% of GDP in 2010



The type of collaboration fostered by Free Software is proving immensely valuable to a great number of people and organizations



Codified intellectual capital like patents may enable or retard the Linux System and Free Software, depending on how they are used



Most parties understand the value of Linux
and the Free Software ecosystem, and are
embracing it

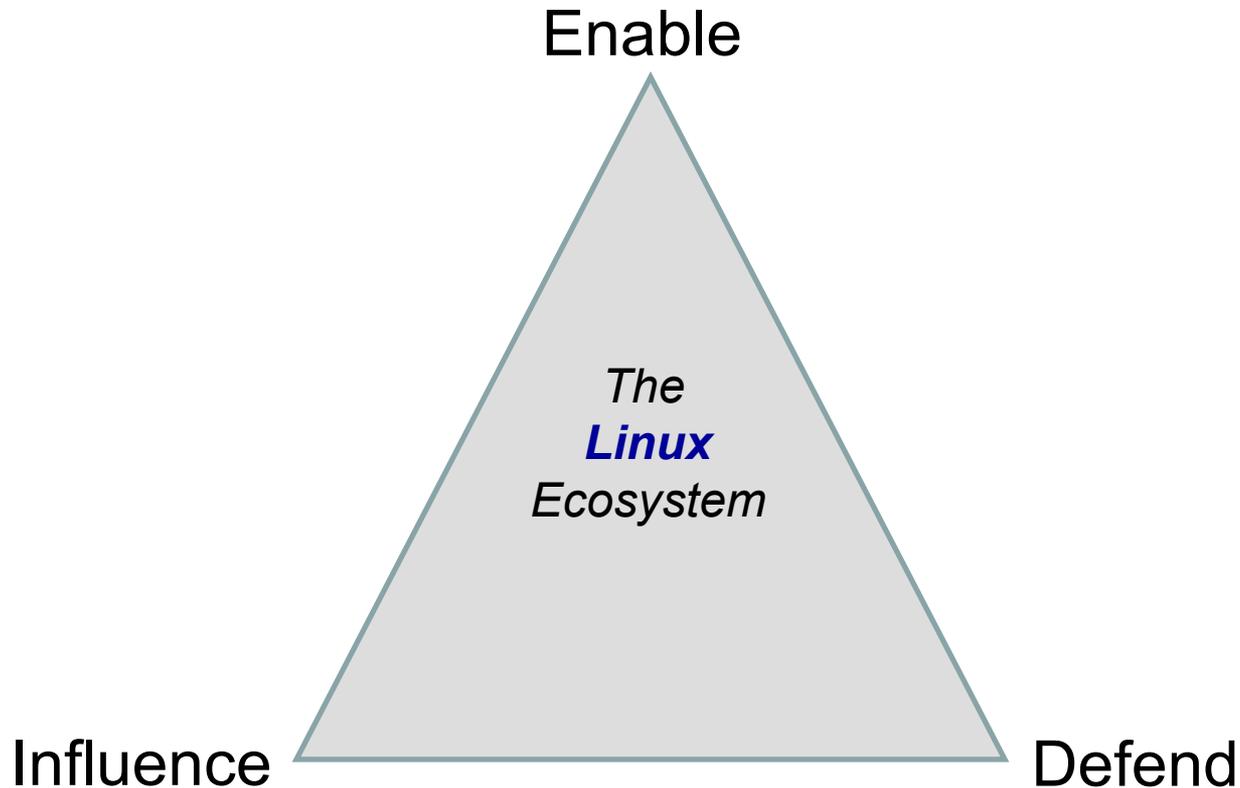


However, there is also an increasing number of patent speculator/troll business models, and they present a challenge
